

1. 185 North Main Street

Carpenter Gothic house built in 1856 by Daniel and Minerva DeLand, founders of the DeLand Chemical Company. Home has three interior brick chimneys and six fireplaces. Original barn also on property. Estate extended from West Whitney to Parce Avenue. Offered to village as a park, but was refused due to costly maintenance.



2. NE Corner Whitney & North Main Street

Fairport Baptist Homes. Original house on site owned by Levi DeLand. After his death, sold to Baptist Church as a home for the aged. Replaced by current complex.

3. 176 North Main Street

Large home built in 1872 around older structure. Decided to Levi DeLand by his mother Minerva for love, affection, and \$1.00. Dining room has Tiffany window; basement has brick Dutch oven for bread baking; side yard has hand-dug well.

4. 42 East Avenue

Original Northside School built in 1886, housing 8 grades. Purchased by Crosman Arms in 1960 and given to Fairport village. Served as a community center from 1969 until the late 1990's. Redesigned and opened in 2002 as The Crosman, a senior living complex.

5. 20 East Avenue

Original brick structure of Assumption Church dedicated in 1883. Replaced by current building in the 1980's.

6. 100-104 North Main Street

Built in 1868 by George Taylor where he produced "Taylor's Oil of Life," a patent medicine designed to cure any and all ills of man or beast. Has since housed a variety of businesses.

7. 23 North Main Street

Original Rochester, Syracuse, and Eastern Trolley station, built in 1906. After use as a trolley station, became a gas station. Remodeled for several businesses; now a retail sewing store.

8. 1-9 North Main Street

First canal tavern and inn built in Fairport in 1825 (or 1827). Originally fronted on canal. Remodeled numerous times. Since the 1930's has housed several businesses on first floor with apartments upstairs. First known as Mallett's Tavern, then as Pritchard's Tavern, and since the 1930's as the Millstone Block.

9. The Box Factory

Site of DeLand Chemical Company, which covered 2/3 of the area between Main Street and Parker Street bridges. Housed N.Y. State Fruit Co., Douglas Packing Co., Certo Co., and Neun Box Co. before being remodeled for businesses and shops in the 1980's.

10. Main Street Lift Bridge

Built in 1912, only lift bridge in the world built on an incline. Written up in Ripley's Believe it or Not.



11. Village Landing/ Packet's Landing

Village Landing built in the 1970's to replace late 19th century canal town buildings. Packet's Landing completed urban renewal process replacing storefronts and lumberyard.



12. 31 South Main Street

Built as municipal building in 1906. Housed town and village offices, jail, and public meeting rooms. Town offices moved to Turk Hill Road in 1980. Village offices remain. Renovated in early 1990's.



13. 70 South Main Street

Built in 1858 in Italian villa style. For many years home and office of Dr. Norman McEachren; now Fairport Federal Credit Union.

14. 84 South Main Street

Built in 1852 by S. Seelye. Similar style to 70 South Main Street. Land once belonged to one of the seven original farm owners in Fairport. Home and office of Dr. John Kraai for many years. Has since housed several businesses.

15. 92 South Main Street

First Baptist Church, built in 1876 for \$35,000. \$12,000 given by neighbor Henry DeLand. Replaced earlier church building on site. Berea sandstone trim; Scotch granite columns. A village landmark and on the National Register.

16. 1 East Church Street

Green Lantern Inn, built in 1876 by Henry DeLand. Chateau-style house with mansard roof; more than 30 rooms with solid chestnut and walnut trim. Subsequently an inn, hotel, and restaurant. Now a private residence and party house. On National Register.




17. 10 East Church Street

Built in 1823 by Dickenson family on banks of canal at Fullam's Basin (Fairport Road bridge) as tavern and post office. Moved to Fairport village in 1850. Housed Fairport's first library and was office of Dr. Eric Jacobsen. Now offices.

18. 20 East Church Street

Fairport Community Baptist Church, formerly Raymond Memorial Baptist Church. Built in 1893 to replace Greek Revival structure, which was moved to



19. 26 East Church Street

First Congregational Church, built in 1868. Third building on site. Oldest congregation in Fairport, first meeting in 1824.



20. 33 East Church Street

Greek Revival house built between 1830 and 1850. Early owner thought to have stored horses in an adjacent barn and used them to pull packet boats along canal. Home of Fletcher Diefendorf, early 20th century Perinton supervisor.

21. 38 East Church Street

Evangelical Church of Fairport. Original building on site, which burned in 1970, was East Church Street School, later used as the church's first building.

22. 39 East Church Street

Considered to be one of Fairport's oldest homes. Constructed in 1817 by Isaac Beers and originally located on the site of the Green Lantern Inn.

23. Greenvale Cemetary

Original section purchased in 1825 from Oliver Tomlinson. Still an active cemetery.

24. 1000 Turk Hill Road

Complex of buildings just east of Turk Hill Road on canal, 1871 home of Cobb Preserving Co., forerunner of Sanitary Can and American Can Cos. Became Crosman Arms building in 1953. Subsequently has housed various businesses and offices.

25. 131 South Main Street

Queen Anne house built in 1856 by George Bown, owner of a carriage factory. Perinton Historical Society started here by Mrs. Bown.



26. 155 South Main Street

Italian villa style with hip roof and enclosed captain's walk, built between 1852 and 1858. Original large farm encompassed all of Orchard Street with orchards back to Mt. Pleasant cemetery. In early 20th century, back end was removed to become first house on Orchard Street.

27. 161 South Main Street

Built in the 1880's by Edward Dudley, grandfather of Richard & Robert of Dudley lumber. Ed ran a grocery store near the canal. Beautifully restored.



28. 164 South Main Street


Built in mid 1870's by George Filkins in Italian villa style with 10" thick walls.

29. 166 South Main Street

Another George Filkins house. Original plaster, windows, and door frames remain. Cooking done in cellar into the early 1900's.

30. 177 South Main Street

1840's Greek Revival cottage originally built with only two rooms, loft, and large stone fireplace for cooking. Enlarged several times. Windows all different, made by hand. Owned for many years by Andrew Deal, owner and editor of the Fairport Herald.



31. 187 South Main Street

Grand 17th century French style sixteen-room house built by Hiram Wilber in 1873. Once housed boarding school for retarded. Richly carved wooden porch, broad massive moldings, and iron cresting on slate mansard roof. On National Register.



32. 199 South Main Street

Victorian house built in 1892 called "The Elms." Owned by the Dougherty family, then Mark and Kate Goddard, and since the 1950's by members of the Hartman family. Known for its revolving Christmas tree.

33. 200 South Main Street

Site of pioneer settler Martin Sperbeck's block house. Sperbeck's brother's cabin was located at the current site of village hall. Path between the two became South Main Street. Current house built in 1840.

34. 205 South Main Street

Greek Revival house built between 1844 and 1853. Doors all different. Solid brass or porcelain doorknobs; original bedroom floors wide planks of pine and sycamore.

35. 224 South Main Street

Once the Arnold farmhouse. Spacious 19th century home still has original mantelpiece.

37. 249 South Main Street

Built by Simeon Howard in 1880, and remodeled in the early 1900's. Part of last surviving farm in Village of Fairport. Land sold and subdivided in 1955.

38. 110 Hulbert Road

Greek Revival house constructed between 1825 and 1840 as tenant house for Filkins farm (site of the present Minerva DeLand School). Moved to present location in 1954.

39. 106 Hulbert Road

Greek Revival farmhouse with broad frieze across front containing "eyebrow" windows with iron grating. Was on an 80 acre farm extending down Hulbert Road toward Church Street.

42. 36 West Street

Built in early 1900's when sleeping porches were popular. Venacular shingle style, artsy-craftsy styling. Note small panes in upper window.



43. 30 West Street

Built in the 1870's. Gothic Revival & Eastlake details. Note barge board trim & lintels, oriel window on side. Complete with barn and mounting blocks. Prosperous homestead.

44. 14 West Street

Restored center-entrance colonial. Original portion of house probably built around 1870 and carefully added to several times. Stands on part of Martin Wood property, as do many homes on this side of West Street. Note barns, both here and behind many homes on West Street.

45. 115 West Avenue

Victorian home built in 1880 on part of Lewis property. Remained in one family for 78 years. Extensively remodeled and restored. Excellent example of how old houses can become new while still retaining their architectural integrity.

46. 94 West Avenue

First appears on map in 1852. Farmhouse originally stood perpendicular to present location where West Avenue and West Street join. Moved so that West Avenue could be extended. Original basement remains under pavement of West Avenue. Has undergone extensive renovation.

47. 83 West Avenue

Built by G. Seelye in 1858, brick Italianate house has hand-cut stone lintels and carvings over windows. Note cupola and leaded glass door. Once a single family dwelling, now tastefully converted to apartments.



48. 79 West Avenue

Greek Revival cottage built around 1849 on property that was once an orchard. Subsequent owners added English country details to windows and gardens. Note entrance portico and eyebrow windows.

49. 71 West Avenue

Former Fairport High School / West Avenue School built in 1924. Remodeled as condominiums in 1985.



50. 62 West Avenue

Frame house with both Greek Revival and Queen Anne detailing, built in 1845. Note main entrance with sidelights. Ransom Vanderhoof, resident from 1856-93, was canal shipper.

51. 18 Perrin Street

Former Fairport Library. Opened in 1938, having been built with WPA funds as well as with many donations, including a major one from Robert Douglas. A Carl Peters mural graces the foyer. Library moved to the Village Landing in 1979. Building is now the Fairport Historical Museum run by the Perinton Historical Society.



52. 30 West Church Street

Main sanctuary of Bethlehem Lutheran built in 1923. Parish center additions made in the 1970's. Sanctuary remodeled in the 1990's, and more renovation done in 2006-7.

53. 48 West Church Street

Rambling, expansive Queen Anne with shingle detailing. Complete with barn.



54. 53 West Church Street

Built in 1858 in elaborate Italianate style complete with tower and iron trim. Remodeled in 1870's by Potter family when porch, porte-cochere, and shingle details were added. When surviving son, Fred Potter died in 1943, home and surrounding 5 acres were left to the Village of Fairport.




55. 31 West Church Street

Brick structure built in 1876 by Methodist Church. Replaced by present complex in the 1960's.

56. 11 West Church Street

Built about 1890, probably around older structure. Excellent example of Queen Anne styling with tower, wrap-around porch, and decorative entablature. First owned by William Newman, then by George Cobb, of Cobb Preserving Co., then by Dr. George Dean. House has been restored by Dr. Dean's daughter, Barbara Dean Stewart.



57. Thomas Creek Wetland Park

Opened in 2000, the park creates a sanctuary for wildlife and a place for quiet walking along Thomas Creek. Connects with the canal path and the Crescent Trail.

58. Mt. Pleasant Cemetary

Founded in 1865 in the Victorian style with winding paths and numerous trees. Located at the top of Summit Street. Includes a Civil War Memorial and many DeLand family graves.
